NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

- 1) Balance Sheet The District holds \$3,000,390 more in cash than last year.
- Treasury Bills Reserve are maintaining their original planned five-layer ladder of \$1.2 million each. Each layer of maturity is from 3 months to 1 year. Average rate of return is 4.71%
- 3) Wells Fargo CD's that mature will continue to roll into the WF Advisors-Cash Sweep account. Those \$2,400,000 of maturing CD's will be transferred into TexPool and Treasury Bills over time. In April 2025 \$490,000 of those CD's matured. In June 2025 \$735,000. The balance of \$1.2 million will mature in October and November of this year.
- 4) Revenue & Expense March 2025 only. The comparison to last March is very close in all the income and expense accounts.
- 5) Revenue & Expense Year to Date has a \$1,492,569 Total Revenue higher than last year. Total expenses are comparative to last year. That increase in revenue brings total revenue YTD to \$3,045,710.
- 6) Budget vs. Actual for the six months is tracking positive on nearly all accounts.
- 7) Checks over \$2,000 are all self explanatory.

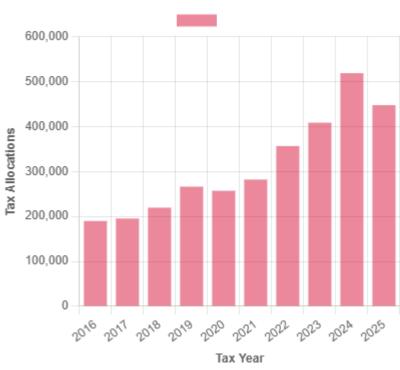
April 2025 Sales Tax Summary

The April allocation reflects sales made during the month of February.

Our April 2025 sales tax allocation was \$447,360 which was down 13.7% (+\$71,111) compared to April 2024 and down 0.6% (+\$21,026) year to date compared to last fiscal year.

Our top 10 large companies accounted for 54.3%, our top 30 large companies accounted for 70.0%, and our top 100 large companies accounted for 83.6% of our total fiscal year to date collections.

Compared to April 2024, an increase of 15% occurred with the Omni Baton Creek Lodging & Food Services). We experienced a 58% decrease with Vaughan & Sons (Wholesale Trade) and a 37% decrease with McCoy's (Retail Trade). We saw positive and negative fluctuations in pest control services, landscaping services, and varying construction-based industries in April that could be demonstrating some seasonal volatility.



April - Sales Tax Allocations by Year

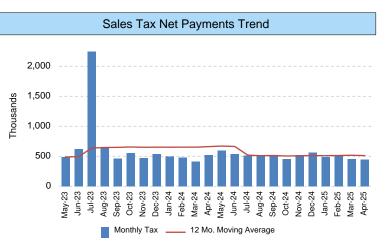

April 2025 Operations Report

Significant Events

<u>March 4 (C) – Brush Fire – AutoAid Received (Westlake, Lake Travis) – 9624 Southwest</u> Parkway

[Truck 302] TK302 had a walk up from nature conservancy at Station 302 requesting a brush truck to extinguish smoldering wood chips. TK302 self-assigned as a public assist and arrived on scene off 9624 Southwest Parkway at the gate. TK302 staged on the roadway while BT302 entered the area led by personnel from the Conservancy. About 1/4 mile in from the road, we found the first area that was burning light grassy fuel. The area was about 200 ft by 200 ft with the wind carrying embers into an unburned area. I had BT302 move further into the area toward a second area burning which was another 200 ft by 200 ft area. TK302 Officer then made the decision to upgrade the alarm to a light brush alarm. I then requested a Tender and additional Brush Truck to be added to the light brush alarm. BAT302 was assigned and responding. As units began to arrive, they were assigned to different parts of the fire. BAT302 arrived and TK302 Officer gave a face-to-face update and we divided the fire ground up into Alpha Division with BT302, BT603, and TK302 Officer as Alpha Division Supervisor. BT302 was with BT903 in Zulu Division with BAT302 in charge of that Division. BAT302 assumed Command and TK302 Officer went to Alpha Division to continue putting the fire out. Nature Conservancy personnel arrived at Alpha Division and found another hot spot area. BT302 was bumped down to the second area and began to extinguish fire in an area with light grassy fuels. All burning areas remained within the black from an original prescribed burn. Water supply was set up at the road on Southwest Parkway with TEN301, E301, E903, and TK302. All crews continued to work the areas until everything was cold. TK302 Captain was picked up by personnel from Nature Conservancy to go up on Vireo Hill and get eyes on the entire area to make sure no additional fire started. TK302 Captain returned to the Alpha Division and continued to make sure the area was fully extinguished. After talking with Nature Conservancy personnel and Command, all units began to be demobilized from the scene. BT302 and TK302 cleared the scene.

TK302 was told that around 2000 we needed to go back out to the area with BT302 to do a quick patrol. BT302 did that and used a TIC. BT302 found no heat or smoke and determined the areas were cold.

BT302 lost three sections of hose due to damage; two sections from the booster hose and one section of $1-\frac{1}{2}$ " single jacketed wildland hose.

[Brush Truck 302] BT302 responded with TK302 to the Barton Creek Preserve to assist personnel from the Nature Conservancy with extinguishment of smoldering vegetation consisting mainly of light grass and mulch. Upon arrival, BT302 entered the preserve through the gate at 9624 Southwest Pkwy. BT302 was led into the property by Conservancy personnel to find multiple locations of smoldering fuels being carried toward unburned vegetation by high winds from the west. BT302 began placing a wet line along the eastern perimeter of the fire line on the northern side of the affected area working towards the south. A light brush alarm was requested by TK302 Captain and communications were moved to FTAC205 by Dispatch. BT302 continued to work the area moving further into the black to stop the spread of wind driven embers. Upon arrival of BAT302, BT302 was assigned to Alpha Division. After the arrival of BT603, BT302 went to water supply that was set up on Southwest Pkwy to refill the tank. Upon return to Alpha Division, BT302 was directed to a new location a little further north by the Alpha Division Supervisor. BT302 continued to work on extinguishment along tree lines moving further into the burned area. After refilling the tank a second time, BT302 patrolled Alpha Division and cooled any additional hotspots with tag lines and hand tools. BT302 retrieved three sections of hose that suffered damaged during initial attack due to heat beneath smoldering areas of mulch and jagged rocks. BT302 was cleared from the scene after it was determined by Command that all areas were sufficiently cooled. BT302 returned to service.

[Battalion 302] BAT302 was dispatched to a light brush alarm to contain a fire that may have reignited from a prescribed burn from the prior week. While enroute, TK302 was already on scene and mentioned they had several small fires in a couple of different locations. On arrival, I didn't notice any heavy black smoke or heavy fire over the ridges. Due to the size of the property, topography, and nature of this particular fire, it wasn't obvious where the initial crews were working (BT301 and TK302 Officer). After entering the property gate, I advised only Brush Trucks to make entry and all bigger apparatus to stage on Southwest Parkway. After caravanning in to the location with the Nature Conservancy, BT301, and BT603, I made a "face to face" transfer of command from TK302's Officer. I then split the fireground into Alpha Division (TK302 Officer was assigned Alpha, and given BT302 and BT603), Zulu Division (BAT302 remained as Incident Command and Zulu with BT301 and BT903), and Water Supply (E301 and TEN301). The heavy wind coupled with the low humidity (red flag warning) allowed the numerous locations of seemingly innocuous white smoke from small patches of grass and shrubbery to catch fire in the black and advance the perimeter at times. The black was approximately 200 acres, in which at its peak, 25% was filled with the aforementioned fuels reburning. Both Alpha and Zulu used multiple tanks to contain the perimeter and work back into the black. After extinguishing all small patches, we decided to clear all units with a plan to come back with one Brush Truck at 1815 and again at 2000. The Brush Truck at 1815 noted a few hot spots they extinguished and cleared. The last Brush Truck sent said it was still out, no signs of fire.

[Engine 301] E301 self-assigned to a reported light brush alarm to escort TEN301 to the scene. On arrival, E301 LT was assigned water supply. A safe fill station was established in the median on Southwest Parkway. E301 coordinated the filling of brush trucks until cleared by command.

[Brush Truck 301] BT301 self-assigned to a grass fire. TK302 also requested other brush trucks. On arrival, we were instructed to monitor an approximate 4 acre area that had previously been burned from a prescribed burn. This area was smoldering and with the high winds had occasional flare-ups. BT301 dumped 4 tanks of water and continued monitoring the area until all hot spots were out cold. BT301 was then cleared by BAT302.

[Tender 301] TEN301 responded with E301 to a reported light brush alarm. TEN301 refilled brush trucks until cleared by Command.

March 8 (B) – Brush Fire – 4921 Amarra Dr

[Battalion 302] BAT302 self-assigned to a trash fire with TK302 and BT302. BAT302 selfassigned due to the caller had called Station 302 directly and reported seeing 20' flames in an area near Station 302. The Firefighter taking the call asked the caller to call 911 to get the appropriate area and resources dispatched. Personnel at the station went to the trucks to get ready for the call and see if any sign of smoke and fire. Dispatch toned out TK302 for a trash fire with call text showing no flames and only smoke. BT302 self-assigned and BAT302 selfassigned. All units arrived at the dispatched location and found no sign of smoke or fire. Personnel walked around residential structures in the area and found on the back corner of the residence of the dispatched address an approximate 150 sq ft area of new mulch burning and smoldering at the corner of the residence. The fire was moving slowly but the winds were gusting and causing embers to blow downhill toward natural mixed vegetation. BAT302 requested TK302 and BT302 crew to bring down two Indian Packs and hand tools to stop the spread. BAT302 notified dispatch where the fire was located and what was burning and that fire personnel would be extinguishing. After the crew arrived with the requested items, a plan was started to access the location with hoselines off the Brush Truck. It took 400' of hose to reach the location with a combination of using two sections in the hose tray and two sections off the wild land pack. Crews applied foam and emptied BT302 and disconnected and refilled at a nearby hydrant. BAT302 used the TIC to check the area and found the first truck full of water had the area cooled down with very little hot spots. After three tanks of water applied and working the mulch with hand tools, BAT302 called it extinguished and crews began to break down equipment to clear off the call. BAT302 was able to get the phone number for the owner and made contact with them. The owner was thankful the fire was taken care of and asked if they needed to do anything. BAT302 asked them if they had sprinklers operational in the area and if so to turn them on. The owner said the sprinklers were set to run at night and would be on. TK302, BT302, and BAT302 cleared off the call and returned service.

<u>March 15 (C) – Structure Fire – AutoAid Received (Austin, CE-Bar, Lake Travis) – 4104 Top</u> of Texas Trl

[Truck 302] TK302 was dispatched to a reported box alarm in box 03-3702 on FireTac205. TK302 arrived on the scene and was assigned to Outside Truck and Outside Division. TK302 instructed crews to place ladders on the exterior of the structure. TK302 Officer walked up to the structure with fire still showing from the garage area. Crews began extinguishing the fire. TK302 did a 360, found the utilities with the gas shut off on the Bravo side, and it was turned off. I walked to the Delta side and found electrical panel and confirmed with Safety that it was turned off. TK302 made sure there were ladders on the Charlie side to the second floor and on the Alpha side second floor. TK302 did another 360 with a TIC to check the exterior for heat and fire. TK302 then set up a PPV fan on the Alpha front door and waited for Inside Division to call for ventilation. Inside Truck called for ventilation to start. Outside Division did another 360 to open door on the Charlie side of the structure. Command called for all crews to do a hot wash to talk about the fire. After hot wash, Command cleared all units except TK302 and E301. TK302 checked the structure for heat and hots spots and opened all the windows to better ventilate the structure. TK302 then helped out with some overhaul in the garage. TK302 found some minor heat around the garage door area and put some water on the affected area. After the Fire Marshal arrived on the scene, TK302 was cleared from the scene. TK302 cleared scene and returned to station for decon.

[Engine 301] ENG301 was third on scene of a working structure fire. On arrival, ENG301 found heavy fire showing from the Alpha / Delta corner; an attached garage. QNT603 was pulling a pre-connected line and had assumed fire attack. ENG37 was parked in front of Q603 and had assumed backup. E301 LT did a face to face with Q603 Captain and suggested he take inside truck, E37 fire attack, and E301 backup. Q603 Captain agreed and verbalized the change of assignments over the radio. E301 crew set up nursing operations and manned a 1-3/4" hand line to spray water into the garage. E37 was also spraying into the garage. It was obvious that gas cans were actively burning. After attacking the fire from the exterior, E301 was reassigned by Command to bring their hose interior to the second floor to investigate possible extension to a bathroom above the garage. E301 crew brought their hose inside and met with Q603, who was waiting to open up the wall in the bathroom until a hoseline was in place. The wall was opened and no fire was found. There was a shared void

space in the wall between the garage and the bathroom, so E301 crew sprayed water into the void to cool it down. E301 crew then backed out for rehab and bottle exchange. The fire was brought under control a short time later. E301 remained on scene during the Fire Marshal's investigation. When they were finished, E301 crew returned to the station to decon and get the truck back in service.

[Battalion 302] BAT302 was dispatched to a structure fire. Prior to my arrival, Q603 pulled a rack line and was in the Offensive mode as Fire Attack on a fully involved garage with one car inside and multiple gas cans reported. E37 showed up and was pulling an additional rack line to be back up. E301 arrived and met with Q603 and reassignments were given. I arrived on scene to find an approximately 6500 sq. ft. home with an attached garage. The attached garage was still fully involved. Assignments were as follows: BAT302 was IC, Q603 was Inside Truck/ Inside Division, E37 was Fire Attack, E301 was Back Up. As the rest of the compliment arrived, the following assignments were given: TK302 was Outside Truck / Outside Division, E1002 was RIC, and multiple units tagged hydrants nearby and nursed appropriately. While Inside Division did a primary search, they requested two handlines on the interior. One on the first floor interior to the Delta side (IC assigned E602), the other was for the 2nd floor bathroom above the garage (IC reassigned E301).

E37 was able to finish fully extinguishing the garage fire and Inside Division reported no evidence of extension to the rest of the house. Outside Truck / Outside Division was able to cut utilities and throw ladders. After the smoke cleared and readings were deemed safe for entry, the residents were allowed back in the house to grab a few personal items. Travis County Fire Marshal's Office was called to complete the investigation for cause and origin. All units cleared and returned to their station.

March 23 (A) - Structure Fire - AutoAid Given (Lake Travis) - 104 Whitley Dr

[Truck 302] TK302 arrived at a reported structure fire with initial units reporting fire already burning through the roof. TK302 arrived as the 2nd truck and was able to get a spot in front of the structure. Soon after TK302's arrival, Command declared that we would be transitioning to a Defensive mode and requested that TK302 get its aerial in place to flow master streams from the bucket. TK302 had two members get in the bucket and set up for fire attack while TK302 driver obtained a water supply from E37. As soon as Command was ready, TK302 began flowing from both master streams. The entire roof was now on fire. TK302 Officer was assigned Outside Division which he remained in that role for duration of the incident. The fire was a wind driven fire, so many handlines from various units were assigned exposure protection assignments to prevent spread to additional houses. TK302 continued to focus on the main body of fire with its master streams until fire was reduced to small hot spots. Handlines surrounding the house continued on hot spots while TK302 shut down its master streams and stowed the aerial while members rehabbed. Command began demobilizing units and instructed TK302 to gather equipment and clear when completed. TK302 put the truck back together and cleared to return to service.

[Battalion 302] BAT302 was dispatched to a structure fire as part of a second alarm compliment. On arrival, the operation was already shifted to a Defensive mode. I walked up to the Command Post and assisted with accountability of personnel and units as well as communications with bystanders, EMS, Fire, and Staging. BAT302 was cleared and returned to the station.
